## **2022-2023** Year in Review

#### **Program Excellence**

Coming out of the pandemic, Edmonton has seen a dramatic increase in individuals experiencing houselessness in our city. Currently there are over 3,000 people who are either in temporary or insecure accommodations, seeking refuge in overnight shelters or sleeping rough in the community. To meet this increased need, we continue to expand our full spectrum of housing services to connect people with appropriate resources.

Our Community Bridge team was able to provide housing loss prevention supports to over 550 individuals. This program uses a financial empowerment focused, case management approach to provide eviction, disconnection, and foreclosure prevention, as well as loan options for arrears as necessary. By improving a household's financial literacy and preventing housing loss, we provide supports to improve housing stability and reduce the emotional and financial cost of houselessness.

Hope Terrace, our program dedicated to providing permanent supportive housing for individuals with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), has accomplished a significant milestone by relocating to a newly constructed, purpose-built facility in King Edward Park. With this move, we welcomed over 20 new residents into the program, extending our reach and impact in the community.

The dedicated staff at Hope Terrace diligently work towards fostering home stability and enabling residents to achieve their personal goals. Our client-centered approach ensures that each individual receives comprehensive support and wrap-around services tailored to their specific needs. Through this program, tenants benefit from a stable and nurturing home environment, opportunities to integrate into the community, dedicated goal-setting sessions, and assistance in attending essential medical appointments, court appearances, accessing mental health resources, and fulfilling other commitments.

By providing a holistic support system, Hope Terrace endeavors to empower its residents, promoting their well-being, and facilitating their journey towards a more fulfilling and independent life.



## **2022-2023** Year in Review

#### **Community Engagement**

In line with our dedication to Truth and Reconciliation, as outlined in our Strategic Framework, Bissell Centre has proactively established an Indigenous Engagement strategy. To ensure the success of this program, we have diligently assembled an exceptional team of staff who are deeply committed to providing meaningful and responsive cultural support to the community. Our primary objective is to foster a supportive and empowering environment that deeply values and honors Indigenous cultures, traditions, and ways of life. By doing so, we aim to create a space that respects, uplifts, and celebrates Indigenous communities.

In February 2023, Bissell Centre organized its most remarkable Coldest Night of the Year event to date. Gathering 561 individuals and families from all corners of Edmonton, our annual walk-a-thon fundraiser surpassed all expectations. Embracing the wintry weather, participants fearlessly embarked on 2K and 5K routes through downtown. The collective efforts of the walkers resulted in an astounding \$195,000 raised, establishing an unprecedented record for Bissell Centre.

#### Infrastructure and Sustainability

Bissell Centre began the renovation of its Bissell Centre West building envelope to improve energy efficiency and improve weatherproofing. The retrofit renovations include new roofing, upgrading windows and doors to a higher efficiency, and insulating, cladding, and adding vapour barrier to the building envelope. This project will provide a safe, insulated, weather tight building for the community to access that also has a smaller carbon footprint.

Our Food Services team has partnered with Second Harvest, a registered charity that is combatting food insecurities across Canada and removing barriers to food redistribution. In a mere 8 months of collaboration, Bissell Centre was able to rescue 224,630 meals from partnering companies, effectively curbing food waste in the community.
